

POP ART

Art made with bright colors and simple, bold images of everyday items, such as soup cans, during the 1960s is called **Pop art**.

Take a close look at this work of art by Marisol, *Tea for Three*. What's going on? What bright colors do you see? You may notice the primary colors—red, yellow, and blue—are a major part of this work of art. These also make up the flag of Venezuela, which is where Marisol's family was from.



Who do you think these three people might be? One of the hands extending out from the middle looks like it is offering you a cup of tea. Would you like to join them? Why or why not?
